The children's eyes light up with new knowledge and especially when they get to harvest lettuce, a radish, or pumpkins.

What positive impacts have The Pencil Patch had on teachers? Teachers were also learning new facts about gardens, the environment and eager to continue to use the BCAITC resources in their classrooms with the students.

What is the most amazing thing you have experienced at The Pencil Patch? I grew up on a dairy farm so teaching the children about cow's and their digestive system was very exciting and giving them a milk beverage from Fraser Valley Dairy Farmers was definitely a highlight for me!

What do students learn about agriculture in the Pencil Patch? Students learn about the type of soil needed for farmers to plant crops. They learn about invasive plants, greenhouses to start crops earlier, to conserve water, learn to find insects that are helpful in our gardens, the importance of bees as pollinators, milk station, and so much more!
